BHH Services

Comprehensive Care Management— Determine if client is at-risk for becoming infected with Hepatitis virus. For clients who have been diagnosed, incorporate ways to treat/manage the virus into their treatment plan.

Care Coordination— For clients who have been diagnosed with Hepatitis, work with external providers to treat virus. Speak with PCPs and specialists to ensure all providers are aware of client's condition.

Health Promotion— Educate clients about the signs, risk-factors, testing and prevention for Hepatitis. Provide clients with pamphlets and other resources on Hepatitis.

Comprehensive Transitional Care— If a client is hospitalized because of complications related to their Hepatitis, work with client and hospital staff to decrease the chances of re-hospitalization.

Patient and Family Support— Provide clients with skills needed to reduce their chances of contracting Hepatitis. Invite family support to attend informational or skill-building sessions.

Referral to Community Support Services— Find support groups, events, or community organizations that can help clients cope with their hepatitis diagnosis.
